

# RECTOR'S Report Fr. David Lynch +



ebbie and I continue to feel blessed to be part of Resurrection's parish family. Your love and support continue to allow me to learn and develop into being shaped as a servant of the gospel. We look forward to what the future holds for our time together in these next years to come.

We have acted creatively and The Rev. David Lynch + generously as a church body supporting the needs of our

communities around us. Through the numerous outreacsustenance from the "Backsnackh ventures, school children continue to get " program; residents at Woods Chapel Lodge and Friendship Manor are provided with a periodic chef's dinner and fellowship; homeless and the needy in our community are served through our partnership with Community Services League; foster youth are supported through our partnership with the St. Francis Foundation, and the list goes on for how the work of this parish represents the Body of Christ and his call to us to love others. I am very excited for what our Outreach Teams are doing and planning for the future.

We continue to support our community with hosting the Girl Scouts who meet at the church on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. We also continue our relationship with the youth soccer program which uses our back yard during the school year. We welcome other programs and community collaborations.

We are a parish family that enjoys fellowship with one another and the many friends of the parish. The last several years have fostered the blessing of animals, productive garage sales, dinners and activities to support local charities, and time to just have fun with movies and games and other activities.

As the future unfolds, we will have more opportunities to celebrate, collaborate and plan with our fellow ecumenical sisters and brothers in the numerous other congregations around us. Through the Blue Springs Police and the Central Jackson County Fire/EMS public safety programs we will be attempting the reorganizing of a Blue Springs Ministry Alliance in 2020. This will hopefully bring together the many faith-based groups to focus on common needs in our greater community, especially that of hunger, housing and community services. We look forward to our usual Lenten programs as well as other community celebrations and collaborations.

Our worship continues to be enriched with music from our

new organ and the choral voices that music director Vaughn coordinates during our program year from fall through spring. I am grateful for the time and efforts that Vaughn dedicates to his work to provide the kind of musical liturgy that richly blesses our worship services and Eucharist. Few know or appreciate the time it takes to plan, rehearse and present music for each Sunday and other worship events at Resurrection. I also appreciate the planning time Vaughn spends and shares with me for each worship season of the liturgical year. I hope you will join me and share your appreciation for his dedication and professionalism.

With support from the worship committee, bulletin and server schedule planning I have had the honor to celebrate as priest and rector with the fine work of acolytes, servers and lectors. It speaks volumes when our youth can comfortably ascend to the lectern and read as well as serve in the other ministries at the altar. I am grateful for the parents and mentors who are encouraging and supporting our youth to be a vibrant part of our worship and parish family.

As we renovate the nursery and youth Sunday school room, I will be seeking assistance to call a nursery caregiver and Sunday school leader. I welcome assistance from parents and other parish members to collaborate with me to find the people we need to fulfill these important ministry roles.

As I have stated in previous annual reports, the life of this church reflects the life of those who are the parish family. We have celebrated together with births, baptisms, confirmations, marriages, and significant life transitions. We have also supported each other in pastoral care and the calling home of those who have gone before us from this mortal life. All these life experiences are the most important aspects of who the Church of the Resurrection is and must be for those who call Resurrection their parish and spiritual home. The most important part of my calling and service with you is to be a guiding, spiritual leading presence with the Holy Spirit as we enjoy this Christian life together. There is not a more important thing for me to be and do, if not to be with you, and serve on your behalf with all my heart, mind and soul.

2019 has been an interesting year of challenges and expectations. The spring rains brought us frustration as we continue to renovate after water damage to the down stairs classroom and nursery. With many thanks to Jr. Warden, Les Woodward, his leadership and his vigilant helpers (Bill Carle, Gabe and Rich Conn, and others), the parish is getting a needed facelift. Les's leadership, experience and know-how have saved the church significantly financially. More information will be provided in Les's Junior Warden report.

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So, you might ask, what about the renovation of the narthex and the addition of the "lift" and removal of that terrible staircase? The strategic planning team and vestry have not forgotten this project nor has it been relegated to a lower priority. We continue to invite contractors who may be willing to do the work at a cost that is reasonable for the parish. With leadership from our Senior Warden and the vestry, we hope to have plans to present to the congregation this spring that will allow us to finally move forward with this significant capital campaign.

My goal for this coming year is to help Resurrection parish continue to be a spiritually inviting place for all to grow in their spiritual journey. As was presented last annual meeting, we will formally take on a process of spiritual renewal. This will begin with the assistance of the Renewal Works program as part of the Episcopal Church Foundation and Forma. This will include a survey and spiritual inventory of our parish. I ask us all to embrace a survey that will provide an inventory of how we can grow in the many spiritual forming opportunities that are identified.

In our vestry retreat in October, we refined our Mission and Vision statements. Our strength as a parish resides in our abilities to live out our mission and focus on the visions for the future. Many thanks to all of you for growing Christianity through your commitments to Christ's call to love one another.

Debbie and I personally thank you for your prayers and support as we have dealt with our family's tragedies and medical issues over this last year. We have experienced joy and sadness as a parish through this last year as some members have moved away, others have passed on to greater glory and yet we have also seen some new faces and welcome new members. This is the life of our church. May we continue to grow in the love of Christ every day as we are blessed and encouraged with all that the New Year brings.

# SR. WARDEN'S Report John D. Biggs, Jr.

To say that 2019 was a busy year would be a gross understatement. We started 2019 off on a wonderful "note" with the introduction of our new Johannes D-470 Ecclesia Organ on Sunday, January 20<sup>th</sup>. The long wait for our new organ was rewarded with Vaughn's excellent presentation of the music that he and this magnificent instrument can provide. Just to remind us that within a matter of weeks we received pledges of \$60,000 to enable us to acquire this wonderful organ when our old organ was biting the dust. Our Parish should take great pride in its ability to raise this amount of money to satisfy this need of our congregation.

Also in the spring, Vestry member, Arla Witte-Simpson, lead an effort to collect suitcases and back packs, under the auspices of the Saint Frances Foundation, to help foster children move in a better organized way when necessary. We gave generously. In addition our parishes generosity was also demonstrated when members contributed funds to purchase 20 new prayer books and 40 new bibles for our pews. This program was funded completely from donations.

In May we were besieged by storms that caused us to receive water damage due to heavy rains and a blocked trench drain. Under the leadership of Les Woodward we tore into this project and realized that we had other problems like mold and other deterioration that were from years ago but were unrecognized. Les and his band of warriors have provided major improvements in our down stairs by replacing a good deal of sheet rock and flooring. This was complimented with a great new paint job. We are indeed blessed to have such generous and talented members within our midst. Special thanks go out to Bill Carle, Rich Conn and others in their efforts to make us whole again. We especially thank Les Woodward for his efforts on our behalf. We are far better off now than we were even before sustaining the water damage.

At the end of the school year we lost Sheria our Nursery Attendant and Gabrilla our Sunday School teacher. We are now considering how we might replace each of these important souls. Many thanks goes out to each of them for their unselfish service.

In June we had another Church Yard Sale for the benefit of our cause. Under the leadership of Rich and Gabe Conn and the brains and brawn of many church members we were able to raise over \$3,200. Thanks to all in this successful effort.

Once again we participated in Church in the Park with All Saints Lutheran in June. A pot luck lunch followed the service. A good and Holy time was had by all of those that participated.

On several occasions we had members volunteer to help in the Sleep in Heavenly Peace project by Bunks Across America in building bunk beds for children that might be sleeping on floors or in other unfavorable conditions. Randy Goyer and Bob Smith both participated

Fr. David attended Cursillo in September. The Episcopal Cursillo Weekend includes a time to experience living in a

supportive Christian community that includes fifteen talks, five meditations and a Eucharist every day. A number of cursillistas from our parish supported him in his weekend.

Bishop Field made his annual visit in August as he officiated in a combined 9:30 service. A pot luck lunch followed the service. In mid-August we had our Organ Dedication and Recital and we filled the Sanctuary and provided glorious recital for all in attendance to enjoy.

Inquirer's classes were held on Sunday Mornings following the 10:30 service from 9/15 thru 10/27. 7 individuals confirmed or received. We welcome to the Episcopal Communion: John States for Confirmation, Sarah States, Nancy Newman, Jim Newman and Carol Middleton for Reception and Angela and Cobina Lartson for Re-Affirmation. Bishop Field presided at the confirmation celebration at St. Matthew's in Raytown.

On September 28 we had a Chili Cook Off and Dessert Auction. Jim Newman won the Chili Cook Off. Daren Blankenship was our surprise auctioneer and he was marvelous. We raised \$1,000 for our parish, were well fed and had a ton of fun with the auction.

Bill Carle once again organized our blessing of the animals. Members and neighbors participated. Then for the second year the Parish was invited to a Bon Fire and Cookout at the Biggs'. The weather cooperated and over 30 of us enjoyed a huge bon fire, hot dogs, cider and great companionship. Thanks to Joyce Biggs and Janet Woodword for their efforts to make this successful.

Sarah States organized trunk or treat for our members and the neighborhood. Jason Conn provided his expertise by providing a Fire Extinguisher class immediately following a 10:30 service. Attendee's should be safer with the techniques provided in the class.

Our vestry continued to meet on a monthly basis. They also had a Vestry retreat to learn specifically about "Renewal Works" and to develop a Mission Statement and Vision Statement. Fr. Larry Ehrens, the Rector at Saint Mary Magdalene led us in learning about Renewal Works. We will all be learning more about this program in 2020. The group then separated into teams to develop Mission and Vision statements. (see page xx)Here is what we developed:

Unfortunately, with last year's water damage we were unable to get this project going. This stairway enhancement and a lift were actually part of our previous renovation project but not enough money was pledged to accomplish this goal at that time. Unfortunately due to the passage of time and improvement in the economy today the cost of this project has gone up significantly. This is a project that the vestry will be continuing to

address to get it accomplished as soon as possible. Continuing to delay will only increase the cost and continue the difficulty in traversing our stairs.

I would like to express my personal gratitude to all parishioners for continued to provide support to the parish. But, more specifically I want to thank Fr. David, Les Woodward, Bill Carle and Jim and Elaine Gilligan for their assistance, insight and support in my efforts as Senior Warden.

#### JR. WARDEN'S Report Les Woodward

he Junior Warden is responsible for evaluating the condition of the building and its systems and coordinating preventive maintenance projects and repairs as needed. Some might find operation and utilization as a ministry to be an unusual way to describe the job of the Junior Warden. However, the first thing that people notice when looking for a church is whether it has curb appeal. It is the first impression of the church. If the building and grounds are in good condition, it conveys a feeling of well-being and community Also, when visitors enter the building, it is important that the interior be clean and well kept. We have been blessed with a beautiful and welcoming house of worship. Nonetheless, maintaining any building or property requires an investment of both money and time by all who use it. Therefore, everyone in our congregation needs to be proactive in the maintenance of the building.

The year 2019 was quite busy for Building and Grounds-a new organ with a speaker tower was installed in the choir loft, as well as new cabinetry and paint in the undercroft. Some things come along unexpectedly. Heavy rains led to water intrusion on the lower level of the building resulting in wet carpet and sheetrock. Several weeks later mold was discovered in the children's chapel and nursery. During the process of mold remediation, termite damage was discovered in the children's chapel. Fortunately, the termites were no longer active. Once remediation was complete, the ceiling grid, ceiling tiles and walls were painted. Ultimately, this work turned into a total remodel project of these rooms and the hallway, which also included removal and replacement of the floor tiles and new LED light fixtures. All brass door knobs were removed, cleaned, polished, lacquered and reinstalled. Much time was invested by several individuals and a special thank you needs to be given to Bill Carle and Rich Conn for all the hours they devoted to this project. Without their help, completion of these projects would not have been possible. Others who have helped with clean-up and painting are Gabe Conn, Terri Smith and Buzz Atkinson.

Plans for the coming year include installation of a sump pit and pump at the east lower level door; new light fixtures and ceiling tiles in the undercroft; a new countertop for the coffe bar; repairs to kitchen cabinetry and flooring; and cleaning and painting the kitchen.

Work on the exterior of the building will include clean-up of the grounds and landscape enhancements, such as additional trees and shrubs around the building Cleaning and repainting of the cross and handrail at the front of the building, along with many other small projects planned for the exterior of the building.

There is plenty of work to be completed inside and out to keep the property shining, so if you see something that needs work or you would like to assist with some of the projects planned in 2020, please contact the Jr Warden..

In October, the Biggs family hosted another hot-dog and s'mores cookout. The first-Sunday Pancake Breakfasts, the Shrove Tuesday meal and a special "He Cooks" meal for the ladies of the church on May 11th were all well-attended. The June 14-15 Parish Garage Sale was successful despite intermittent showers. Our first-ever "Trunk or Treat" held on October 26th was organized by Sarah States and was a spectacular success.

On June 30th, Resurrection held a joint service in Blue Springs Park with All Saints Lutheran Church. We joined with the Ecumenical Group once again for joint meals and services in Lent. Fire-extinguisher and CPR-AED training were held again during 2019. Dr. Bill Stancil graced us with his presence on March 24 & 31 and December 8 and 15.

Visitors to Resurrection were recognized and celebrated. Local visitors were welcomed with home-delivery of a small gift while gift bags for all young visiting children were available in our narthex. We continued to publicize special services and events through the use of yard banners and online communications.

Members of the committee also worked to schedule and support use of the church by outside groups including three Girl Scout troops, a youth soccer academy and a quilting guild. Parish groups meeting at the church included the Daughters of the King and our Finding Faith Through Fiction book club.

### COLUMBARIUM Report John Biggs

The Vestry-authorized Columbarium Board consists of five members of the Church. The Senior Warden serves as Chair of the Board while the Rector serves on the Board and appoints the remaining three members (each to serve a three-year term). As of this report, members include Father David Lynch, Sr Warden John Biggs, Elaine Gilligan (term through January 2020), Bill Carle (through January 2021) and Mary Liddle (through January 2022),

The purchase of a Right to Inurnment in the columbarium is priced at \$1,500. It is important to note that all funds received from the sale of Rights to Inurnment are separately accounted for and maintained as a restricted account for Columbarium purposes. Twenty of the forty niches have been reserved as of the end of 2019. Parishioners interested in the purchase of a Right to Inurnment should speak with a Board Member.

In December 2016, the Vestry authorized the Columbarium Board to establish an outdoor Memorial Garden, set appropriate guidelines for the operation of the garden and to purchase a suitable plaque to list the



names of those whose cremated remains are interred in the garden. The Memorial Garden was dedicated on November 5, 2017.


We feel that the Daughters of the King is not only a spiritually rewarding program but one that does good work for the church and the community.
